ON-CAMPUS TRANSPORTATION: For those with limited mobility and others needing assistance, golf carts will be making regular rounds between the dorms, student center, and meeting facilities.

USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES: Cell phones must be muted during meetings and plenary sessions. Parents with children in the nursery, preschool, and junior programs are asked to have their phones muted but on during the time their children are in those programs.

Keith Mann



This session will look at Scotland's Covenanting heritage, where the conflict between Christ and the state was played out on the mountains and hills of Scotland, with many laying down their lives for the "Crown Rights of Jesus Christ." It will also look at present-day Scotland, a "progressive" state, deeply damaged by liberal theology, where levels of Bible-believing Christians fit the definition of an unreached country. Finally we will look to the future, and particularly highlight concrete ways in which believers from other countries can help support the revival of gospel-preaching churches across Scotland.

THREE MARTYRS, TWO SURPRISING TRENDS, ONE FOUNDING FACT

First Christian martyr? Stephen! Last Covenanter martyr? James Renwick? Wrong! Three Covenanters died for Christ in the last 100 years, one a 1932 mystery, one a young life cut short in 1953, and one an old man tortured and killed in 1955. What little noted trend, begun ten years before 1891, led to a shrinking church, and ten years before 1990 led to a growing church? What part did the University of Glasgow and Princeton University play in American Presbyterian church history? These questions answered and more in this session by church historian Dr. Bill Edgar.

PASTORAL CALLING & THEOLOGICAL TRAINING

Barry York, DMin

The words of our Lord remain as true as ever. “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few.” In the RPCNA, pulpits need pastors, cities need church planters, and foreign fields need missionaries. In this session, Dr. Barry York, RPTS president and professor of Pastoral Theology and Homiletics, will share this need with participants, walk through the process of discerning a man’s call to the ministry, and explain the flexible ways the Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary provides help in preparing for a life of service in Christ’s harvest fields. HOW CAN WE HELP?

THE WHITE CHIEF

Faith Martin

The White Chief of Cache Creek tells how Reformed Presbyterian missionaries worked to bring the Gospel to the Indians in southwestern Oklahoma. Contrary to popular narrative, the missionaries were well received and deeply loved by the people they went to serve. It is a complex story spanning 70 years. Their first converts were the fierce Comanche warriors who had fought the army to the bitter end. Confined to the reservation, they faced starvation and exploitation. Their conversion to Christianity was wholehearted and lifelong but complicated by economic and political issues on the reservation.

DO YOU WANT TO BE IN A CHURCH PLANT?

An overview of the importance and experience of being a vital part of a church plant.

CONGREGATIONAL SINGING IN A CHURCH PLANT

TRIUMPH OF MERCY: THE USE AND ABUSE OF MATTHEW 18

This session will look biblically, theologically, and interactively at the relationship of justice and mercy in the Christian life, applying faith in Jesus to how we must practice mercy while letting justice go to the cross. Seeking justice is not wrong, but demanding justice before forgiveness is. The apostle Paul teaches, “Why not suffer wrong?” (1 Cor. 6:7)—rather than breaking fellowship in the church and exposing

the church to the devil's delightful disdain and destruction among God's people in Christ. The aim and call will be to find mercy, justice, and peace in a life lived before the cross of Jesus.

THE CENTRALITY OF MEEKNESS

Adam Kuehner

As Reformed Christians, we are increasingly influenced by a polarizing pseudo-Christian subculture of counterculturalism. As followers of the One who rides forth for "truth, meekness, and righteousness" (Ps. 45:4), we have often treated meekness as the neglected middle child. From a historic Reformed and biblical perspective, however, these three virtues are inseparable. This breakout session will explore the centrality of meekness in our great King's triumphant cause, seeking to equip church members with "wisdom from above" for the difficult, yet rewarding task of peaceably sowing seeds of righteousness in their local church and beyond.

PRECENTING FOR THE MUSICALLY ILLITERATE

An introduction to precenting from the ground up. Can't read music? Not a problem. All you need is a desire to serve God and the ability to carry a tune. Topics covered include reading musical notes, recognizing musical keys, and finding the right pitch.

PRECENTING TECHNIQUES AND PRACTICE

A follow-up to "Precenting for the Musically Illiterate." If you can find your way around reading music, but don't know much about how to lead a congregation in song, this session is for you. Topics we'll cover include setting the tone and keeping time. We'll conclude with a psalm sing to give you and your fellow participants an opportunity to practice what you've learned.

We're developing a complete K-12 Christian classical curriculum in Mandarin that is contextualized culturally and historically, and that is specifically designed to be functional even in their current "underground" situation. One translation project that we are excited to announce is Catherine Vos's *Children's Story Bible* from Banner of Truth Publishers.

GETTING THE GOSPEL RIGHT

Gospel means "good news." When you think about the Gospel, is it really good news to you? When you share the Gospel with a non-Christian, are you really presenting good news? GENERAL INFORMATION

Welcome to the Recreation Program at RPIC 2024! The conference staff has worked hard, along with our hosts at Indiana Wesleyan University, and other local facilities, to arrange a wide variety of recreational options for every age group. We are offering everything from our infamous volleyball tournaments and open gym experiences to getting your competitive juices going with a game of Scrabble or building a puzzle with new friends.

Recreation Headquarters Location: Conference Office, Barnes Piazza 147

Please stop by the Recreation Headquarters starting on Tuesday afternoon to sign up for the activities in which you wish to participate. Recreation staff will be there to answer questions.

So, bring your sports equipment (balls, bats, gloves, etc.) and favorite board games, card games, and puzzles to enjoy with others!

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

MODESTY: The conference observes a conservative dress code. Skirts and shorts must be fingertip length. Tops must have two-inch straps. Males must wear shirts unless at the swimming pool. Everyone must wear swimsuits that provide appropriate coverage while at the swimming pool.

LIABILITY WAIVERS: A completed liability waiver form must be on file with the Conference Committee in order to participate in any

recreation at the indoor or outdoor athletic facilities. A single waiver will cover parents and their children under the age of 18. Waivers are to be submitted when you check in at registration. If you do not complete a form at registration, you may stop by the Conference Office (Barnes 147) during regular office hours. A parent/guardian signature is required for those under 18.

RULES AND REGULATIONS: The IWU and RPIC 2024 conference staff will be enforcing the rules and regulations listed in this document and as posted at various locations around the campus facilities. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations and/or the directions of campus and conference staff members may result in banning the offender from further use of the recreational facilities.

FACILITIES

RECREATION AND WELLNESS CENTER: The RWC houses a variety of recreation and fitness facilities as well as classrooms used during the morning by the Juniors program. Within the RWC, the Intramural Activity Center (IAC) is a multipurpose area that can be divided into several courts for basketball and volleyball. No dunking is allowed on the basketball courts. Non-marking, rubber soled shoes **MUST** be worn on the regulation courts.

A 3-lane elevated walking and jogging track can be accessed from the second level of the RWC. In addition to afternoon and evening recreation sessions, this track will be open in designated mornings for walking and jogging.

The RWC also offers a fitness room (must be 14 or older), a free weight room (must be 16 or older), racquetball courts, a climbing wall and a swimming pool. Equipment for use in the RWC may be checked out from the IWU staff at the front desk in the lobby. You will need to leave your RPIC 2024 name tag or a driver's license with the attendant.

OUTDOOR FACILITIES: Outdoor recreation facilities include the practice/intramural softball, baseball, and soccer fields, sand volleyball courts, outdoor basketball court, and the track. Equipment for outdoor activities will be available from the RPIC 2024 recreation staff.




